### **Volunteering Round Up**

Native revegetation projects ramped up this past winter with planting occuring at 14 sites. From foreshores and riversides to grasslands and woodlands, volunteers across the municipality came together to plant a total of 3981 native trees, shrubs, herbs and grasses.

A fantastic effort to all involved and we can't thank you enough for helping us make Glenorchy greener.



In July and August, Claremont Coast Care extended the Curlew Parade foreshore planting with 500 Poa grasses. They propogated seed from the site earlier this year, after a workshop with the Understory Network.

The top photo shows thriving native pigface, growing at the Curlew Parade site after being planted two years ago.

Conservation Volunteers Australia (CVA) brought together 10 volunteers including staff from FedX to plant 100 native plants, filling in the area planted by Cadbury staff, two years ago at Windermere Bay.

The aim of this planting is to provide a buffer between the walking path and breeding birds at Windermere Bay.



CVA returned to Whitestone Point for the second year in a row, to plant Blue Gums, Banksias and grasses, in a grassy reserve.

22 volunteers braved a cold day to plant 110 plants which will provide important habitat for wildlife in the future.



New Town Rivulet Platypus Landcare Group held their first ever planting event!

30 people planted 170 small trees, shrubs and grasses to stabilise the bank and provide habitat in the future.

Increasing shade over the rivulet encourages growth of the creatures that platypus love to eat!

Lutana Woodlanders continue to enhance the Kangaroo Grass grassland in Lutana.

They increased the ground flora biodiversity by planting 135 herbs and poa grasses typical of the Kangaroo Grass Grassland.

They have also replanted the Lennox Ave entrance to the reserve.





Following removal of invasive boxthorn from the coast, 12 CVA volunteers planted the riparian zone with 160 native plants, followed by our contractors, Wetlands & Wilflife Creations who planted a further 375 further down the steep bank.

Prince of Wales Bay will be a focus for planting in the 2026 season.

Collinsvale Primary School, Friends of Collinsvale Landcare and Council Staff all worked together to plant 65 trees at Collinsvale Recreation Reserve, opposite the dog park.

The trees were planted to replace 10 trees removed from the Collinsvale BMX track to improve it for community use.





### **Volunteering Round Up Continued...**



Conservation Volunteers Australia returned to Goulds Lagoon for the third year, continuing buffer planting between the road and the lagoon.

With 550 new plants added, planting here is now complete, covering the full western side of the lagoon.

Northern Suburbs Landcare returned for a second year planting at Montrose Road Reserve.

Over three sessions, 320 native trees, shrubs, herbs and grasses were added to the Islet Rivulet site, extending the natural area by a few metres and replacing a bank of ivy.



On a beautiful blue-bird winters day, Moonah Nature Mates planted 140 native plants into Jim Bacon Memorial Reserve, extending the natural area with three new native sections.

These sections will allow the native ground flora such as Kangaroo Grass and Blue Devil to come up in between the planted trees.

As part of the Derwent Estuary Program and GCC saltmarsh extension project at Windermere Bay, volunteers from CVA and Claremont Coastcare planted a massive 770 plants in the riparian zone of the new saltmarsh.

In the future this will grow into a woodland, providing important habitat for birds and shelter for the saltmarsh.



Students from Rosetta Primary's E-Team met three times over the winter to plant 100 native plants at the rivulet behind the school.


The kids loved getting their hands dirty and can't wait to watch the plants grow!

#### **Natural Areas Update**

Contractors have been controlling weeds in Lutana Woodlands, Catherine Street Reserve, Poimena Reserve, Wellington Park, and New Town Rivulet.

GCC teams have recently been working on boneseed control at the top of Springfield Avenue, and other weeds in Roseneath Rivulet.

GCC now has four qualified bushfire fighters within the team. We are working towards introducing ecological burning in our reserves.

Aside from planting, volunteers have been busy weeding Spanish Heath in Wellington Park, weeding Cocksfoot from Lutana Woodlands and creating biochar out of Boxthorn at Prince of Wales Bay.

GCC are working with the Commonwealth Government to finalise the grant deed for a large environmental project on Humphreys Rivulet, focussed on erosion, weed control and revegetation.

The renaturalisation project at the mouth of the New Town Rivulet is almost complete! GCC and City of Hobart are hosting a big planting day on the 1st November. Email Ash for details!
